
Orlando Pair Wins Four-Ball

Jeff Robinson and **Bret Voisin** fired a 63-70—133 to capture the **42nd Florida State Four-Ball Championship** at **Quail Valley Golf Club** in Vero Beach on July 17-18.

Robinson, of Longwood, and Voisin, from Orlando, posted a 9-under par 63 to lead by three strokes after the first day. In the second round, the duo made birdies on holes 3 and 7 to make the turn at 11-under par for the tournament. After a brief weather delay, they came out to birdie the 17th hole and finished with a bogey on the 18th hole for a 36 on the back nine and win the Championship by one stroke. This was the first State Four-Ball Championship that they have played together.

Frank Strafaci, of Davie, and Rick Woulfe, from Fort Lauderdale, tied with Charles Walters, from Bradenton, and Len Lasinsky, of Sarasota, finishing one back from the leaders, each team shooting a similar 67-67—134. In the final round, Strafaci and Woulfe recorded an even par 36 on the front nine and had a 31 on the back nine with an eagle on the 14th hole. John Warsing, from North Miami Beach, and Michael Nealy, of Boca Raton, shot a 67-68—135, two strokes back from the Champions. Defending Champions Ben Gardner and Phil Koch, of Boca Raton, tied with three other teams finishing the event at 5-under par 139.

Eustaquio & Graham Named Junior Champs

Judson Eustaquio and **Wesley Graham** emerged as the Champions of their respective age divisions at the **50th Florida State Junior Championship** at **The Golden Bear Club at Keene's Point** in Windermere on August 2-3.

In the boys 16-18 age division, Eustaquio, of Lake Worth, fired a 5-under par 139 to take the title by one stroke over **Tyler Hitchcock**. Going into the final round, Eustaquio, 16, shared the lead with Hitchcock, 17, after each shot a 4-under par 68. In the final round, Hitchcock was 4-up after two holes but then Eustaquio recovered to lead by two strokes after nine holes. Eustaquio was sinking putts all day to go 5-under in the last 15 holes to finish with a 71 and win by one stroke. Hitchcock, from Clermont, placed second shooting an even par 72 in the final round, 140 two-day total. **Billy Horschel**, from Grant, finished 3-under par 141, shooting a 73-68 to place third.

In the boys 13-15 age division, **Wesley Graham**, 14, of Port Orange, maintained his first round lead to win the title shooting 68-74—142. **Julian Suri**, 13, of St. Augustine, jumped from third place the first day to tie for second place firing a 72-74—146. After a first round score of 77, **Matthew Krembel**, from Shalimar, blasted a 69 to tie with Suri at 146.

The Championship featured 48 teams of two playing 36 holes of four-ball stroke play in the two-day event. In four-ball stroke play, two competitors play as partners, each playing his own ball. The lower score of the partners is the score for the hole. Forty teams qualified through one of the nine qualifying events and the other eight teams earned exempt status.

Dade Amateur Defends Junior Team

More than 40 teams representing state junior golf programs competed at **Plantation Golf and Country Club** in Venice for the **Florida State Junior Team Championship** on July 17 -18.

After 36 holes in the boys 16-18 division, the **Dade Amateur Golf Association** and the **Bay Hill Junior Program** were all tied at a two-day total of 292 after **Michael Sedacca**, of Bay Hill, forced a playoff when he birdied the 18th hole. In a sudden death playoff on the 18th hole, the **Dade Amateur Golf Association** won by one stroke to win the title for the third straight year. **Jeremy Alderman**, 17, **Nestor Delgado**, 18, and **Carlos Velez**, 16, all competed on last year's Championship team. In the girls 16-18 division, the **Dade Amateur Golf Association** also won the girls division as sisters **Rebecca** and **Jamie Kuhn** teamed up to fire a 165-160—325 two-day total. Rebecca, 18, who will be attending LSU in the fall, birdied two of the last three holes to post an even par 72 for the final round.

In the boys 13-15 age division, the **Junior Golf Association** of Broward County team of Bobby Bode, 15, Neil Horsley, 15, and Clint Ramsden, 15, recorded a 143-153—296 to place first in the division. Horsley led the team shooting a 70-76—146. In the girls 13-15 division, the **Greater Sarasota Junior Golf Association** placed first with scores of 161-158—319. **Rebekah Thomas** led her teammates, **Christina Miller** and **Maria Ronderos**, shooting a 76-78—154.

In this 36-hole stroke play competition the total of the low two of the three gross scores count for each round. This event is open to junior programs that provide organized tournaments, instruction or clinics which are open to all junior golfers in the community. The boys 16-18 age division played the Plantation's Bobcat course from approximately 6600 yards and the girls 16-18 division played the same course at 6000 yards. The boys 13-15 age division competed on the Panther course from 6400 yards as the girls 13-15 played from approximately 5800 yards out.

What's So Different About Match Play

A lot! That's why there are so many "strange occurrences" that seem to happen.

First of all, Rule 2-1 tells us

"a match consists of one side playing against another over a stipulated round unless otherwise decreed by the Committee." Match play is a horse of a different color compared to stroke play when it comes to Rules. Primarily, because the rights of another 88 or 154 players do not have to be defended by the Committee. It is just a match between you and I and the only thing any of the other players in the tournament want to know is who won?

Granted, the match is played under the Rules of Golf but sometimes players may not be aware of a Rules infraction. As long as they do not agree to waive the Rules but instead are ignorant of the Rules, the results of their match will stand.

For instance, if two players agree not to play a particularly difficult hole or agree to omit a couple of holes they do not like, they would be disqualified for not playing the stipulated round (Decision 2-3/3). However, if the players had inadvertently omitted a hole in playing their match, the result of the match would stand (Decision 2-3/2).

Recently, at our Match Play Championship at Indian River Club in Vero Beach, I know of one player who unknowingly played a stroke at a ball that was out of bounds. As long as his opponent did not lodge a claim, the results of the hole stand.

In another match, two players walked off the 16th green think-

ing that the match was finished but before the results were posted realized that they had not concluded the match. They resumed the match and went 19 holes before a winner was determined.

In fact, Rule 33-1 informs us that "certain specific Rules governing stroke play are so substantially different from those governing match play that combining the two forms of play is not practical and not permitted. The results of matches played and the scores returned in these circumstances must not be accepted."

So the next time you go out to play a match, brush up on Rule 2 "Match Play" and enjoy the day.

Remember, it pays to know the Rules. Knowing the Rules of Golf can help you win a match and enjoy the game of golf.



This is the first year the FSGA held qualifiers for the State Junior Championship. After eight qualifiers, 90 of the top junior golfers in the state advanced to the Championship. Next year, the Florida State Junior Championship will be played at **Palma Ceia Golf and Country Club** in Tampa and will be a 54-hole event.

As we continue to work closely with the AJGA, the Champion of the regular division receives five exemptions into AJGA events. The top five from the regular division receive three exemptions each into AJGA events and the top ten finishes will receive one exemption toward an AJGA open tournament. Additionally, the top three finishes in each age division receive a full exemption into the 2004-2005 Florida Junior Tour and the 4-10 finishes receive three exemptions into the Florida Junior Tour. Also, the top 10 finishes in the 16-18 division will be invited to compete in the **Florida State Junior Match Play Invitational** at **Lake Nona Golf Club** later this month. The top five finishes in the 13-15 division will also be invited to compete in the Junior Match Play Invitational.


FSGA Awards Six Scholarships
