

FSGA Pace of Play Policy Revised for 2004

by Jack Pultorak, FSGA Director of Rules and Competitions



"We had to wait on every shot! What took so long?"

How many times have you wondered what was taking that group ahead of

you so long to play? Were they slow? How come they didn't invite your group to play through? Were they lining up every putt from both sides? Did

they think they were playing for a million bucks? Where's the ranger?

The biggest problem in golf today is pace of play. Many organizations have addressed this problem by instituting policies for pace of play ranging from timing checkpoints to actually having a group punch a time clock after each nine holes. Many have had success while others have not been so fortunate.

The FSGA has revised its Pace of Play Policy for 2004, aligning itself more closely with the USGA Pace of Play Policy used in competitions. We will continue to use officials to monitor groups without using color coded flags or cards and you will not see a time clock next to the ninth or eighteenth green. Here it is in a nutshell.

If a group falls behind, two factors are involved to determine if a group is "out of position." The first is their allotted time as determined by the Committee. This is a time scheduled set by the Committee usually based on a predetermined amount of time for each hole; typically 13 minutes for a par three, 15 minutes for a par four and 17 minutes for a par five. The second is their position in relation to the preceding group. This varies

will be notified that it is "out of position" and subject to timing. If a monitoring official finds any player in the group to have a "bad time" (usually 40 seconds to play a stroke but in some cases 50 seconds if that player is the first to play in some situations), that player will be issued a warning in both match and stroke play. If a player has a second "bad time", the player will be assessed a loss of hole penalty in match play or a one stroke penalty in stroke play. A

third "bad time" carries another warning in match play or an additional two stroke penalty in stroke play. A fourth "bad time" results in a penalty of disqualification in both forms of play.

Pace of play is serious business and if you are planning to play in any competitions conducted by the FSGA, this Pace of Play policy will be strictly enforced. The complete Pace of Play Policy is available on the FSGA website at www.fsga.org in the "Tournaments" section. I suggest you read it.

Remember, it pays to know the Rules. Knowing the Rules of Golf can help you save strokes and enjoy the game of golf.

depending on the par of the next hole and position of the group or groups playing it. Generally, once a group is in violation of both of these conditions, they are "out of position."

A group may very easily fall "out of position" by simply having to look for a lost ball or having to obtain a ruling. Any group that falls "out of position" is expected to regain its position within a reasonable time.

So good so far. Here's the meat of the Policy!

If an official finds a group out of position, some predetermined steps to correct the situation will be implemented. **First, the group**
