Tampa's Jim Kennedy Has Kind Words For FSGA Staff

Jack Veghte, Clearwater, won the Florida State Golf Association's 53rd. Annual State Amateur Championship at Tomoka Oaks Country Club in Ormond Beach. His score of 282 bettered nearest competitor Beau Baugh of Cocoa by seven shots. Veghte led the tournament, Florida's oldest continuous sporting event, from box to wire. His rounds of 68-72-72-70 outclassed a strong field of the state's best amateur golfers. More than half the field had handicaps of two or less, an indication of their ability. Veghte's final round was a methodical marvel as he briskly fired a steady 35-35-70. Baugh, a smooth swinging 19-yearold, shot a 71 for 289 and second place. Rankin slipped to 74 and into third spot. Brian Hawke came from far back with a final round 68 and finished fourth. The field was divided into flights at the end of the second day of play. The flight winners were: Jim Barber, Clearwater, 1st Flight, 295; Charles Edwards, Plant City, 2nd Flight, 304; Ted Slamel, Orlando, 3rd Flight, 307; Dennis Rinaldi, Jensen Beach, 4th Flight, 309; Phillip Reid, St. Petersburg, 5th Flight, 314; Wes Paxson, Jr., Jacksonville, 6th Flight, 320; Fred Kelly, Miami, 7th Flight, 330. In all, a total of 52 prizes were awarded in the 184-man field.

James G. Kennedy, a regular FSGA tournament participant from Tampa, expressed his pleasure with the State Amateur in these words, "I wish to commend your organization on the running of the tournament and particularly on the type of golf course that was chosen. I felt that the golf course tested the <a href="mailto:amateur">amateur</a> golfer's abilities and he need not be near professional in performance to play a creditable round. Once again, let me commend your organization on a well tournament and an excellent tournament site, with the hope that future sites for state tournaments will be similar." Thanks for the kind words Jim. We, too, look forward to more tournaments at courses like Tomoka Oaks.

FSGA Mourns Passing of Carl Dann, Jr.

## 1970 TOURNAMENTS REPORTED TO FSGA

Gary Koch, Tampa's highly regarded golfing teenager, captured his third straight Florida State Golf Association Junior Championship at Bobby Jones Golf Course in Sarasota. His rounds of 69-72-72, 213 brought him the unprecedented third triumph. He won at Forest Lakes in 1968 and again at Rolling Green in 1969, setting a tournament record score of 204. Koch's final round of 72 was good for the victory with a two shot margin. John Duggan, Ft. Lauderdale, finished with a 73 and second place. Buddy Alexander, St. Petersburg, slipped to a 77 after being tied with Koch at the end of 36 holes. He finished sixth. Coleman White of Miami was third. Pete Wells of St. Petersburg was fourth and Gene Rucker of Miami took the fifth spot. Robert Prindle III of Lake Park won the 12-14 age group with rounds of 75-80-77, 232. Mark Fisher of Lakeland was runner-up with a score of 239. A field of 135 junior golfers began play in the annual event sponsored by the Florida State Golf Association. Twentyseven of the future golfing greats won prizes.

The Florida State Golf Association will hold its Third Annual Sectional Tournament at Lone Palm Golf Club in Lakeland on Sunday, August 9, 1970. Entry fee is \$10 with one dollar from each entry going to the College Scholarship Fund. The 1969 event raised \$140 for the FSGA Fund. Moot Thomas, fine Ocala amateur, was the winner when he defeated Dexter Daniels, Jr. of Winter Haven in a sudden-death playoff. The two had tied with 18-hole scores of 72. Entry blanks for this year's event were mailed to all FSGA members and are available from the State Office in Sarasota.

Death came in June for Carl Dann, Jr., Orlando. Dann, who owned and operated Dubsdread Golf Club, was one of Florida's finest amateur players for 25 years. He won the State Amateur five times. His first victory was in 1933. He followed with wins in 1934, 1937, 1938 and 1949. His many friends in FSGA mourned his passing and the Association reponded to the family request not to send flowers but to forward any remembrance to the American Cancer Society in Orlando.
