STICKL BEATS CASE IN MID-AMATEUR

Gary Stickl, a former Indiana State Amateur champion, outlasted an exceptionally strong field to win the Florida State Mid-Amateur Championship at Fiddlesticks Country Club in Fort Myers.

Ironically, Stickl ballooned to a 10over-par 82 in the first round of medal play qualifying and was a longshot to make the match play field of 16. He rebounded with a 73, though, and squeezed into match play with his 155 total.

"I guess I was lucky to make it," he said, "but once I got into match play, my confidence really started to build. Beating (defending champion Bob) Kouwe was probably the best thing that happened to me in the whole tournament."

Stickl defeated Kouwe by a 2-and-1 margin, then downed Case 4-and-3 in a weather-delayed final.

"I was just glad to get it over," Stickl said. "After that rain delay, I didn't think I'd be able to swing. I stiffened up, and the course was so wet I honestly didn't think we'd get the rest of the round in."

Kouwe took medalist honors with a 73-68--142 total and established

himself as the favorite to win the title once again. But Tom Knapp, who has won the Florida State Amateur Championship the last two years, had other ideas. In the quarter-finals, Knapp and Kouwe hooked up in the most spectacular match of the tournament.

Knapp was 1-up through 16 holes, and then Kouwe hit his tee shot into the water on 17. To avoid defeat, Kouwe had to sink a 30-foot putt for par at the 17th. He did it, although he still needed to win the 18th to force the match into extra holes,

Kouwe, suddenly possessed by the putting demon, sank a 60-footer on 18 to even the match. Then, on the first hole of sudden death, he made a 12- footer for a winning birdie.

The defeat ruined Knapp's dream of becoming the first player to win State Amateur and State Mid-Amateur in the same year.

After he lost in the semifinals to Stickl, Kouwe was philosophic: "You can't win when you make the mistakes I did. I played just terrible. I drove the ball beautifully, but I hit some bad iron shots and missed three putts from three feet. Gary played just great."

In the final, Stickl and Case were even until a lightning storm interruped play after six holes. On the 7th, Stickl made a 25-foot birdie putt to go 1-up. He went 2-up with a par at the 8th, then eventually closed out his opponent with a 35-foot birdie putt at 15.

Fiddlesticks' Long Mean course, widely recognized as one of the toughest in Florida, proved—as expected—to be a great test for the state's best 25-and-over golfers.

FOR SENIOR **VICTORY**

Who says "youngsters" win all the senior tournaments?

Not Chris Kappas of Ponte Vedra Beach, that's for sure. Kappas, 65 years old and going strong, captured the Florida State Senior Championship at Gainesville Country Club with an impressive come-frombehind performance.

Kappas opened with a 75, then closed with a 71 as he moved past defending champion Pursie Pipes of Boca Raton and Bill Koressel of Pensacola. Pipes and Koressel shared the first round lead with scores of 71. but Pipes faltered with an 80 on the final day and Koressel shot a 79.

Kappas also caught Jacksonville's Bill Scarbrough, who finished second with rounds of 74 and 73. Scarbrough's 147 total ended up one shy, as Kappas proved to be a veteran performer who is accustomed to winning the close ones.

The victory made Kappas a senior champion of a second state, for he won the Wisconsin Senior Championship in 1976.

Since moving to Florida six years ago, Kappas has kept his game in shape at demanding Sawgrass, where he has been the club champion two years in a row.

Kappas is chairman of the board of Lake Electric Motors in Racine, Wisc., and calls himself semi-retired. He does, however, spend considerable time in research and development of electric trolling motors for fishing.

Bill Coons of Gainesville finished third, two strokes behind Kappas, while Hank Phillips of Temple Terrace was another shot back in fourth place.

The state's senior magicians had trouble mastering the tricky Gainesville course, and Kappas, Pipes and Koressel had the best scores of the tournament-71.

"This is a tremendous honor," said Kappas. "I am really thrilled to beat all these fine players."

KAPPAS RALLIES | "TOM TERRIFIC" DOES IT AGAIN

Tom Knapp, making good on his promise to show his younger opponents a thing or two, won the Florida State Amateur Championship for the second year in a row and became the first player since Bob Murphy in 1965-66 to turn the trick.

Knapp finished with a 3-under-par 285 total at PGA National's Champion Course and beat runnerup Jav Schrader of North Palm Beach by six strokes.

"I wanted to win bad," said Knapp, 37 and the president of an oil drilling firm. "There was a lot more pressure on me this time. Last year I was an unknown, but this year everyone was gunning for me. But that's the way I like it."

Knapp, who lives in Teauesta, is a former pro who played the mini-tours

for several years. He burst into the amateur spotlight by winning last year's State Amateur at Grenelefe in Haines City. At PGA National, he made it two straight by staying cool.

Knapp fired rounds of 73-68-74-70. while Schrader was less consistent with rounds of 69-80-68-74.

"I just tried to make pars," said Knapp. "I was hoping everyone else would make mistakes."

Schrader did. After scoring birdies in the final round at 13 and 15, he finished bogey-double bogey-bogey on the last three holes.

Knapp, even par on those three holes, stretched a two-stroke advantage to six. David Jackson of Monticello and Ron McCann of Orlando tied for third, seven shots back of Knapp.

Schrader played this year for Florida Atlantic University. Jackson is a University of Florida player, while McCann will be attending the University of Miami on a golf scholarship. Nolan Henke, who was fifth, plays at Florida State University.

"I like to play courses like this because the harder the course the better it is for me," Knapp said, "Now I want to win it three years in a row, and next year's course (Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach) is another one of those hard ones."

And so Tom Terrific walked away into the sunset, leaving the state's younger players more determined than ever to take away his crown.

REFRAM "BOUNCES" TO JUNIOR TRIUMPH

Dean Refram, who carries the same name as his father – former PGA Tour player and well-known Florida golf figure Dean Refram Sr. – proved he can play some spectacular golf of his own by capturing the Florida State Junior Championship at Frenchman's Creek in North Palm Beach.

The 17-year-old Refram won the title on the first hole of a sudden death playoff with 15-year-old Scott Brown of Lakeland. Refram parred, while Brown bogeyed after hitting his second shot into the edge of a palmetto thicket.

The pivotal hole of the tournament, though, was the 36th. Refram needed a par four to tie Brown, but his second shot caught a pine tree about 10 feet off the green.

Had the ball bounced in the wrong direction, Refram could have been left with a very demanding up-and-down to save par. But the ball came to rest on the fringe, some 50 feet from the hole. He chipped within two feet to send the tournament into overtime.

"It makes it harder to win a playoff when you're good friends with the guy. It's a lot easier when you hate the guy. Scott will be around again. This has happened to me plenty of times."

Not recently, however. Before coming to the State Junior, Refram won the Florida State Boys Invitational at Lehigh Acres.

Both Refram and Brown finished with 36-hole totals of 144 at Frenchman's Creek. Refram had identical rounds of 72, while Brown posted scores of 74 and 70.

Miles McConnell and Michael Sposa tied for third at 146, while 15-year-old Gary Nicklaus was watched by his famous father as he triple bogeyed the first hole en route to an 82 and a 155 total.

"I've been practicing real hard at Saddlebrook (the course designed and built by his father)," said the younger Refram. "I'm trying to be more consistent."

Indeed, Refram lost his bid for three tournament titles in a row when he failed to defend his championship in the North Florida PGA Junior, played the week after the State Junior.

Refram will be a senior this fall at Tampa Prep, and he would like to earn a college golf scholarship "either in Florida or out West."

STROKE HOLE ALLOCATION SERVICE

Clubs using the GHIN System may receive a hole-by-hole Handicap (Stroke Allocation) Service to assist them in ranking holes for match play purposes.

The service uses the "Allocation by Need" principle which compares the scoring average of average golfers to the scoring average of low handicap golfers on each hole. When the difference between the two averages is relatively large on a hole, it indicates great need for an average and higher handicap player to receive a stroke from a low handicap player.

Hole-by-hole scores from golf club scorecards are entered for an analysis of score versus handicap on each hole. This produces a degree of difficulty slope for each hole, and the highest slope holes are then allocated first, and the low slope holes

WAGNER WINS **HANDICAP CHAMPIONSHIP**

His friends tell him he looks like Craia Stadler.

His rivals tell him the same thing, but in jest. They want him to believe he can lose his composure in a fashion similar to the PGA Tour's famous Walrus.

So it came to pass that Bradenton's Chuck Wagner, the Junior Walrus, took his 15 handicap to the FSGA's year-opening State Handicap Championship at the Plantation Inn in Crystal River.

Wagner liked the golf course, calling it "fun, with some great holes on the back nine and some short ones to get you started without much trouble."

In the first round of the quota points competition, Wagner hit 15 greens in regulation but didn't make a birdie. Still, he ended up with a plus-8 total on points.

Right behind him was 5-handicapper Joe Ondo of Winter Park, who shot a nifty 70 in the opening round. Ondo was plus-7 on points.

"I can play like a star one day and scrape it around the next," said Wagner, who is a member at demanding El Conquistador Country Club in Bradenton. "Just one time l'd are allocated last. Other outputs from this service are:

- 1. Overall average score for each hole; based on scores provided;
- 2. Average by low handicap players for each hole;
- 3. Average by high handicap players for each;
- 4. Ranking of holes by degree of difficulty "slope;"
- 5. Ranking of holes by low handicap average minus par;
- 6. Ranking of holes by high handicap average minus par;
- 6. Ranking of holes by high handicap average minus par;
- 7. A percent net distribution of net eagles, birdies, pars, bogies, double bogies and triple bogies.
- 8. Gross and net average scores for the front nine, back nine and overall.

The Golf Committee can use this.

analysis to help determine the best stroke allocation for their golf courses. The allocation guidelines established in Section 9 of the USGA Handicap System Manual should still be applied when determining the final allocation order.

A minimum of 300, 18-hole rounds are required and a maximum of 500 will be accepted. Names are not required, but each card must clearly show the player's handicap. Up to four rounds can be reported on one scorecard. You should attempt to obtain 100 scores from low handicap players. This is defined as eight and below for men and fourteen and below for women.

The hole-by-hole allocation service is offered to you exclusively through your golf association and the GHIN System. If your club is interested in receiving this service, please contact our office.
