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SAM SMIDT -- 1922 TO 1992 -- *by Cal Korf*

Golf lost the greatest of friends when Sam Smidt died on September 24, 1992 at his home in Lake Worth. A former president of the Florida State Golf Association and an acknowledged rules authority, Sam was an unusual man who kept giving and giving to the game he loved.

It is difficult to measure an ordinary person's contribution to golf, but Sam was not ordinary. His contribution was overwhelming. He gave everything he had. Even as his health failed, his determination to serve the game remained rock-solid.

The greatest tribute to Sam Smidt is the lasting respect that was his. His friends loved, admired and respected him. Some golfers, however, didn't hold him near and dear. Regardless, they respected him.

As a rules official, Sam was a fierce taskmaster. He watched players like a hawk with the Rules of Golf in his claws. This unrelenting seriousness caused a few competitors to become wary of him, although Sam is directly or indirectly responsible for hundreds of players forcing themselves to learn the rules.

But he was a compassionate man as well. If he ruled against a golfer, he always approached that person after the round and carefully explained the particular rule. His belief was that golf helped develop better people, better citizens. He loved the honesty and self-reliance that were necessary in the game.

"If every state in the country had a Sam Smidt, golf would be at a higher level than it is," said Dean Knuth, Director of Handicapping of the United States Golf Association. "To me, he was Mr. Golf in Florida. Beyond that, he was a man of the very highest integrity. He was really a warm, caring person, and he and Roz (Sam's wife) have been an extraordinary couple for a long time."

Sam often credited Don Smith of the PGA of America for fostering his interest in the Rules of Golf. Said Smith: "We started doing rules workshops in the mid 1970s. I did a workshop in Boston, and Sam was in the class. He told me he was retiring and coming to Florida. He said he wanted to help, he wanted to get involved. "Well, you know how that is. I didn't really give it much thought. He didn't even know where he was going to live in Florida. We started the Club Professional Tournament Series, and we were playing at Indian Trail. I'm out there in my cart, and this fellow drives up. "Remember me?" he asks. It was old Sam. I was running the tournament by myself. I didn't have extra rules people. So I gave him a radio and asked him to help me. That was the start of something really tremendous. He was great."

"We always kidded him that he was giving a rules clinic to a player when he made a ruling. But that's the way Sam was. He would always take that player aside later. He would get out the rules book and go over the whole thing. He was very instrumental in teaching a lot of the younger players and quite a few of the older ones, too. It didn't matter weatherwise, Sam was always there. You'd almost have to yell at him to get him to go home."

Len Charnay was one of Sam's closest friends, and it was Sam who convinced Charnay to become active in the measurement of courses. Sam was interested in all phases of the game, Charnay stressed. "Many of the boys," he said, "signed up to work just because Sam asked them to. He got many people involved in rules and measuring golf courses."

Bill Baker, a past Vice President and Director of the FSGA, called Sam, "a cracker jack," and a close personal friend. Baker also pointed out that Sam "had a great sense of humor" about the rules. "He wasn't as tough as some people thought," Baker continued. "He was genuinely interested in getting everybody to understand what the rules were."

Baker said that Sam was "an expert at organizing golf tournaments." His strategy, according to Baker, was "to meet with all his people and make sure they understood what they were doing....offering a critique of their work and being very candid about his observations." At the same time, Baker said, Sam would always stand up for his fellow officials once they made a decision.

Dr. Ray Columbaro, a current FSGA Director and member of the Executive Committee, served a voluntary "internship" with Sam re: the Rules of Golf. Ray provides the following: "I'll remember Sam Smidt for many reasons because he was a very special and unique individual. Most of all, I'll remember the many pleasant days we spent together on the golf courses of South Florida. Since we were both *early birds*, we frequently met at our chosen courses when the first rays of the sun sparkled on the morning dew that covered the grass. We were there to mark the course for an upcoming qualifier or tournament, or to run an event or to finish a playoff from the prior day's tournament. Whatever the reason, I always looked forward to seeing Sam and hearing the many *pearls of wisdom* he would pass on to me during the day. I'll remember his warmth and upbeat attitude, even when faced with a serious illness. But also, I'll remember his strong desire to be accurate and fair when discussing and applying the Rules of Golf, marking a golf course, and writing a local rules sheet. He seemed to always have a story that would serve as an example to illustrate his views in a particular learning situation. Sam was truly gifted as a teacher and motivator toward excellence, especially in his chosen field, the Rules of Golf. He ranked with the best professors I've had the pleasure to study with and enjoy learning from. Because of Sam's great love of golf and endless energy, he spent many hours of many days of his life as a rules official and tournament administrator. So many that South Florida will need an army of volunteers in amateur and professional golf to complete the typical yearly schedule that Sam accomplished with ease."

Sam's attachment to golf goes back to his youth. At the age of 12, he became a caddie at Salem Country Club in Peabody, Mass. He started with a "B" rating and was paid 75 cents a round.

In his business as a tanner, he supplied leather to the shoe and airline industries. After his retirement -- allowing him to concentrate on golf -- he served as a rules official in the U.S. Open, Ryder Cup and many other major tournaments.

But it was in Florida where he had the greatest impact. Big tournaments or small, Sam was there. He loved golf at every level, and his life reflected that love.

I personally learned the Rules of Golf from Sam. I first met Frank Strafaci, Sr. and Sam in 1982 when I went to southeast Florida to generate some interest in the "new" USGA Course Rating system. We all three became very involved in the development of FSGA and the learning of the Rules of Golf. Sam took me on as his personal project.

In those early years, I always stayed at Sam's house when in the Palm Beach area. Over dinner and late into the night Sam would ply me with situations and interpretations. I learned more than just the rules from Sam. He taught me much about business, people and life. Sam never let personalities impact on his call concerning the rules. Sam told me many times: "You don't have any friends when adjudicating a rule of golf -- you just apply the applicable rule."

Here's what Sam once said during an interview: "As far as I'm concerned, 90 percent of the battle in rules officiating is preparation of the golf course and writing of the local rules. If an official doesn't do his homework, there can be all kinds of problems. Then you start getting into different opinions. There's nothing solid, except for common sense -- and that doesn't solve anything when it comes to the rules. For every three days on the golf course, you've got three or four or five days of advance work. It isn't just going to the tournament site and officiating."

Sam had as much interest in the success of FSGA as he did with the rules of golf. He gave much of himself in promoting and helping FSGA in many ways. Sam and I travelled together all over Florida in those middle years of the 80's. We marked countless golf courses in the preparation for a qualifier or championship. Sam was a master at creating a Local Rule sheet. His influence is indelible on the Local Rule sheets that we provide you. (You guys ought to read one sometime!). Sam was my friend and my mentor. I loved Sam as my brother, although there were times when he chose to provide me with guidance and thought he were my father. I miss him greatly and truly appreciate all the things he did for me personally and for the FSGA.

There is no way to replace Sam Smidt.

A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

1992 is almost behind us. The final schedule for 1993 plus all the qualifiers (State Am, Mid-Am & Match Play), as well as the USGA qualifiers are all enclosed in this newsletter. We have had a couple date changes from the tentative schedule furnished to you in the last newsletter.

ENTRY FORMS: Let me explain how we handle mailing of entry forms. All of you who have become 1993 members will receive a mailing of every entry in the third week of January plus a personalized FSGA supporting member bag tag. The next mailing will be mid-February for those who renewed their membership after the initial mailing. We only ordered enough bag tags for the first 1,000 members so if you do not receive a bag tag your response was not quick enough.

FOUR-BALL: Based on last year's experience I am sure the field will be full long before the normal closing date. Since we are returning to the same venue I am sure that those who were there will want to return and those who did not make it will want their turn. All I can say is get your membership in and respond when you receive your entry. Every event in 1992 filled prior to the closing date except Life at Forty. Actually that was filled early, but we had a rash of withdrawals a couple weeks prior which kept us from having the 1992 norm of stand-by list. We will notify all stand-by entrants of their status as soon as the field is full. If you do not receive a stand-by notice you are probably in the field (we are not responsible for delivery of U.S. mail).

USGA MEMBER'S TOURNAMENT: The USGA had planned to initiate a national handicap tournament in 1992. The format will be Four-Ball. Qualifying will be conducted at the club level similar to the Oldsmobile Scramble (details are unavailable as yet) followed by several Regional qualifying sites in every state. The plan was for the national finals to have been in Pinehurst for 1993; however, USGA has decided to delay until 1994 to insure that their organization will be more detailed and prepared. They conducted two test tournaments in two different states in 1992 and both demonstrated great interest and enthusiasm. USGA has decided to have one full blown test in 1993 and the site will be FLORIDA. Details and initial entry form will be in Golf Digest and the USGA Golf Journal.

The initial qualifying will be an 18 hole stroke play event at the club level and will be conducted by the host club golf professional. The next level will be several regional qualifying sites throughout Florida, which will be conducted by FSGA, also in an 18 hole stroke play format. The finals will be in Florida and will be a Four-Ball match play event over two days (either 8 or 16 teams). This will be at a great site -- **BLACK DIAMOND** and will be conducted by FSGA & USGA. I urge all of you to support this and provide them with a great test for this concept.

SAM SMIDT SCHOLARSHIP FUND: Thanks to so many of you who contributed. We have a good start for a continuing funding of two individuals per year to attend a PGA/USGA Rules Workshop. Details will be finalized by our scholarship committee at the next Board of Director's meeting. If you had set aside the intention of contributing, please send it along with your membership renewal.

Hope you all have a great holiday season and look forward to renewing acquaintances next year. Wish you all a better game for next year with a plethora of pars and birdies.

NEW EQUITABLE STROKE CONTROL PROCEDURE

The United States Golf Association has established a new Equitable Stroke Control Procedure for the USGA Handicap System and **will take effect January 1, 1993**. The following table will be used to set the maximum score for posting purposes and will replace the previous procedure:

<u>COURSE HANDICAP</u>	<u>MAXIMUM SCORE POSTED ON ANY HOLE</u>
9 OR LESS	6
10 THROUGH 19	7
20 THROUGH 29	8
30 THROUGH 39	9
40 THROUGH 49	10
50 AND ABOVE	11

Example (provided by the USGA): A player with a USGA Handicap Index of 19.2 plays a 120 Slope course which gives that player a Course Handicap of 20. For handicap purposes, that player is allowed a maximum score on any hole of 8. There is no limit to the number of holes reduced to 8 in the round, so the player can quickly scan his/her scorecard to locate any hole scores of 9 or higher and reduce them to a score of 8. The reduction is applied to allow a maximum score of 8, no matter what the par of the holes may be. Again, for handicap purposes, that player could pick-up on a hole after seven strokes because the best the player could score is 8. Also, this player will find that a lower Slope course with a Course Handicap of 19, his maximum score will be 7.

The new ESC procedure is simpler to use because players need to remember only one number -- their maximum hole score allowed.

The procedure also provides a number at which a player can pick-up, if not in stroke play tournament which requires the player to hole out.
