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BLOOMINGDALE WINS STATE TEAM TITLE, ISSUES CHALLENGE

Bloomingtondale Golfers Club in Brandon is not your ordinary golf facility.

"a" First, there is the name — there is no mistaking that the club is designed for golf and nothing else.

"We are devoted 100 percent to golf," explained Bobby Stricklin, the club's president and general manager. There is no swimming pool, and there is no tennis. This is a place you can come and play golf, talk golf, eat golf... everything is golf.

"We have a one-acre practice green," Stricklin continued. "This place is designed for people who want to be the NFL armchair quarterbacks of golf on a participating basis."

"b" Second, there is the quality of the members of Bloomingtondale — more than 100 members have handicaps less than 10.

"We're sitting around one day," Stricklin explained, "and we decided we should start getting active in FSGA activities. Then we decided it was time to dethrone Avila (of Tampa) as the team champion. For us, this was the ultimate challenge."

So Bloomingtondale took two teams to Sugarmill Woods Golf Club near Homosassa Springs, and the No. 1 team whipped the No. 1 team from Avila to win the state team title.

The Bloomingtondale squad was remarkably consistent, posting a four-man total of 289 the first day and 290 the second.

Avila, meanwhile, opened with a 303 and then added a 288 score. Bloomingtondale's 579 total was 12 better than Avila.

"Next, we're going to put two such groups together and take both first and second," challenged Stricklin. "We would love for teams from all around the state to try and beat us."

The Bloomingtondale No. 1 team consisted of Wayne Rudzewicz, Wyatt Meyer, Curt Madson, Jerry Cohen, Chris Murman and Denny Rouse. Under the tournament format, the lowest four scores were counted in each round. The Avila No. 1 team included Bob Kouwe, Kim Schwencke, Pipp Patton, Rick Brown, Fred Ridley and Jim McNulty.

One honor did elude Bloomingtondale, as Avila's Kouwe shot rounds of 75 and 68 to claim the individual title. Wayne Rudzewicz of Bloomingtondale was two strokes back at 145, and Bloomingtondale had four other players under 150.

In an interesting development, Rouse actually switched from the 1983 Avila team to the 1984 Bloomingtondale squad. He still maintains memberships at both courses, but Stricklin insisted he belongs to Bloomingtondale.

"He lives here," said Stricklin. "Heck, it's important to have loyalties."

And now one of Bloomingtondale's big loyalties is to its state team championship. "We intend to bring it back here again next year," concluded Stricklin.

INDIAN CREEK TO HOST STATE SENIOR

If you thought 1984 was a great year for Florida golf, just wait for the 1985 tournament schedule to unfold.

The Florida State Golf Association, in a continual effort to hold the best possible tournaments, has earmarked its 1985 championships for some of the finest courses in the state. In fact, there is no question these layouts are among the best in the entire United States.

The State Senior Championship, the first major event of the year, is a perfect example. The 36-hole event, scheduled May 11-12, will be played at exclusive Indian Creek Country Club in Miami.

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PAXSON, HOPKINS WIN FOUR BALL WITH BIRDIE ON FINAL HOLE

Winners Wes Paxson Jr. and Pat Hopkins laughed about a strange twist of fate in the State Amateur Four-Ball Championship, played at The Ravines outside Jacksonville.

"We looked at the trophy, and there wasn't a score on there that was as high as ours," said Hopkins. "But there aren't many courses as tough as The Ravines."

"I've been in plenty of tournaments where I thought I was in contention wasn't," admitted Paxson, "but I've never been in where I thought I was out of it and suddenly I ended up winning."

Paxson and Hopkins opened with a best-ball 71, then finished with a 70 for a 36-hole total of 141. The two Jacksonville golfers scored a one-stroke victory over two other teams — Mark Bucek and John Reeves, plus Dwaine Roney and Mike Womble.

What it took was an extraordinary birdie on the final hole, and the story of that hole is fascinating.

"We're back at 13," said Paxson, "and I hit it real close. About three feet. Then I missed it. At that point, we figured we were just about out of it.

"You know how hard the 18th hole is. When we got there, we both hit our drives in the fairway. Then somebody told us we were tied for the lead. That was hard to believe, but we decided to try for a birdie. The pin was cut at the front left, and we both hit 5-irons in there. Pat's shot hit up near the green and rolled all the way back down the hill. Mine hit up there, too, but it stayed in the fringe.

"I was just trying to make a par at that point. I figured I could chip within three feet or so and make the putt. Then we would take our chances in a playoff."

Hopkins added his analysis: "Wes has probably beaten me in just about everything, sometimes by chipping in. I told him to make it. He said he couldn't do it — it was a tough shot. So I told him to imagine he was playing me in the club championship.

The ball took two bounces, hit the flagstick and went in. It was just great."

If the ball had missed the pin, Paxson admitted, it would have rolled about four feet past the cup and left him with a tricky downhill putt. "It was your basic slam-dunk," he joked.

"Winning the tournament was really a joy," added Hopkins, "because it was one of the nicest events I've ever played in. And now we get to go to Houston."

Paxson and Hopkins will represent the FSGA in the Champions Cup Invitational Matches, to be played March 14-17 at Champions Golf Club in Houston, Texas. The Champions tourney is a 72-hole best-ball competition which has included teams from as many as 33 states. All players must be at least 25 years old and must have handicaps of five or less.

"It is our goal to field the best two-man teams in the country and from as many states as possible," explained Dan E. Hendricks, chairman of tournament operations.

RULES QUIZ

The following quiz on the rules of golf was again extracted from the rules quiz given to the 1985 Metropolitan Golf Association rules officials. The questions were prepared by Dr. Richard Silver, who is a long time recognized rules authority with the MGA. Answers will be found on page 5.

- In stroke play, a player's tee shot is headed for a water hazard. He announces that since his ball might be in the hazard, he is going to play a provisional ball and does so.
 - If the player finds his first ball in the water hazard, it is the ball in play.
 - The second ball is in play under a stroke and distance penalty.
- Through the green, a player's ball comes to rest on top of a small twig. The player is asked by a fellow-competitor to lift his ball due to interference. Before playing his stroke, the fellow-competitor removes all the loose impediments in the area, including the small twig on which the player's ball had rested.
 - The player gets a break from the Rules and replaces his ball on the ground in front of his marker.
 - The player should replace his ball on a small twig to reproduce its original position as closely as possible.
- In stroke play, a player's ball comes to rest on a putting green about ten feet from the hole. He marks, lifts and cleans the ball and replaces it. While studying his line of putt from the other side of the hole, his ball begins to move and rolls about three feet toward the hole.
 - The player incurs a one-stroke penalty and the ball is replaced.
 - There is no penalty and the ball is played from where it came to rest after rolling.
 - The player incurs a one-stroke penalty and the ball is played from where it came to rest after rolling.
- In stroke play, a player's ball comes to rest on the apron of a putting green. A sprinkler head on the putting green interferes on the player's line of play.

The player lifts and places the ball in the nearest position to where it lay, not nearer the hole, so that the obstruction does not interfere.

- The player has proceeded correctly.
 - The player is required to drop the ball and not place it.
 - The player is not entitled to relief.
- Through the green, a player strikes a ball which goes out of bounds. Before dropping a ball, he replaces and presses down all the divots in the area to prevent his ball from rolling into a divot hole.
 - He has proceeded properly.
 - He may replace only the divot taken by his shot.
 - He may not replace any of the divots.
 - In stroke play, with the Local Rule for embedded balls in effect, a player's ball was embedded in its own pitch-mark. The player lifts his ball, but before dropping it, repairs the pitch-mark to prevent the dropped ball from rolling into it.
 - The player incurred a one-stroke penalty.
 - The player incurred a two-stroke penalty.
 - The player proceeded properly.
 - A player, when addressing his ball on a putting green, grounded his putter in front of the ball. Before lifting his putter and grounding it behind the ball, the ball moves.
 - There is no penalty.
 - The player incurs a one-stroke penalty and plays the ball as it lies.
 - The player incurs a one-stroke penalty and the ball is replaced.
- If you have a question about a rule or a situation which occurred during play, please forward your question to the FSGA office. We are fortunate to have Sam Smidt as one of our directors. Sam is recognized as one of the foremost rules authorities in the country. It is the unusual and unique situations that arise during the play of the game which became incorporated into the Decisions book. For instance, this year fifty new decisions will be added to the 1984 Decisions book.

FSGA CHAMPIONSHIP ENTRY PROCEDURES

Entry applications for our championship events are sent to FSGA individual members and member clubs well in advance of an event. Due to the large response we have had to our championships, we ask that you mail your entries in with the entry fee rather than phone in your entry. This gives all our members an equal chance to participate. Receipt of your entry will not be acknowledged prior to the mailing of the pairings. If the championship fills up prior to the closing date, we will hold all excess entries and

checks and fill any vacancies with them in date of receipt order. All entries not used will be returned along with the entry fee the day after the championship. NOTE: The State Amateur and State Mid-Amateur Championships have a closing date well before the actual event. Please note the closing date and forward your entry in time. The necessity for qualifying for these two events are the reason the closing date is early. Entries will not be accepted after the closing date.

FLORIDA OPEN

This year the Florida Open will be conducted by North Florida PGA, South Florida PGA and FSGA at Innisbrook. There will be qualifying throughout the state for approximately 130 spots. The prize list for amateurs will be the best ever presented. The top ten amateur places will each receive a \$350 merchandise certificate and the top 20 amateur places will all receive a sizeable award. FSGA has six exemptions — four go to the top four finishers in the 1984 State Amateur and two to the winner and runner-up in the 1984 State Mid-Amateur Championship.

RULES QUIZ ANSWERS

QUESTION	ANSWER	APPLICABLE RULE/DECISION
1.	B.	Rule 27-2 Dec. 27-2a/2
COMMENT The second ball is not a provisional ball. A provisional ball may be placed only for a ball which may be lost outside a water hazard or may be out bounds.		
2.	B	Rule 1-4 Dec. 23/15
COMMENT Under the Rule for equity, the player should replace the loose impediment.		
3.	B	Rule 20-3d Dec. 20-3d/1
COMMENT Since the ball had been at rest for a few seconds before it started rolling, it is in play from its new position and there is no penalty.		
4.	C	Rules 24-2a and 24-2b (iii)
COMMENT The player is entitled to relief, for interference with his line of play, only if his ball is on the putting green.		
5.	B	Rule 13-2 Dec. 13-2/5
COMMENT Under Section 1, Etiquette, it is not a breach of Rule 13-2 for a player to replace his own divot. However, the replacement and pressing down of other divots in the area in which a ball is to be dropped is prohibited by Rule 13-2.		
6.	B	Rules 13-2 and 25-2 Dec. 13-2/9
COMMENT The player incurred a two-stroke penalty for improving the area in which his ball was to be dropped.		
7.	B	Rule 18-2b Dec. 18/5
COMMENT The player has addressed the ball even though he has placed his club in front of the ball.

Indian Creek actually is located on an island in Biscayne Bay. Although the private facility opened way back in 1930, it has been played by very few non-members over the years. When the State Senior Championship was held at Indian Creek in 1983, it was the first outside tournament played at the club.

Now the senior tourney returns to Indian Creek, and the top 55-over golfers in the state will battle for the title won last year by Chris Kappas of Ponte Vedre Beach. Kappas, who was 65 at the time of his victory, shot rounds of 75 and 71 at Gainesville Country Club to edge Bill Scarborough of Jacksonville by one stroke.

Indian Creek is a landmark facility with a wonderful clubhouse and challenging golf course. The clubhouse features a Spanish-Mediterranean style and has perhaps the grandest locker room in the whole country.

"The greens have just been re-grassed," said Russell, "and the contours on the greens have been changed. Players who played it two years ago are going to find it even more interesting this time. It is imperative to take care in reading the greens.

"The golf course is fairly rolling," continued Russell. "It has a number of surprising and interesting elevations to it."

"I've been in locker rooms all over the world," says Henry Russell, a member of the club since 1950, "and this is the most magnificent I've ever seen. It looks like a cathedral. It's just beautiful."

The golf course is just as lavish, and golfers in the senior event will find newly contoured greens to challenge them.

Three holes border Biscayne Bay, and the course features over 110 bunkers just to make things interesting.

Over the years, Indian Creek has been transformed from a club for winter residents to one that offers golf throughout the year. The clubhouse, though, is still closed for several months.

Contestants in the senior tourney will find the Indian Creek hospitality unmatched anywhere else, as the entry fee includes such amenities as a practice round, valet parking, buffet lunches, range balls and all gratuities.

It should be a memorable event, but then look at some of the other championships for the year — the State Amateur at Sawgrass, the State Mid-Amateur at Jupiter Hills, the State Team at Fiddlesticks, the State Four-Ball at Grenelefe... the list goes on and on.

PILGRIM ENDS CLAYTON'S REIGN IN LIFE AT FORTY

Ron Clayton had won the FSGA's Life Begins At Forty tournament two years in a row, but the third time was not a charm for the Sarasota golfer.

Clayton ran into a real Pilgrim — Lamar Pilgrim, a 47-year-old Lakeland golfer showed everyone a thing or two at Lehigh Country Club.

Clayton shot rounds of 72-69-69, which was a nifty 6-under-par for 54 holes... and he got beat by three strokes!!! Pilgrim was one stroke better in each round, with scores of 71-68-68.

"I didn't give it away," said the

45-year-old Clayton. "He just won it. I play good, but he just played better."

Clayton actually caught Pilgrim early in the final round. After he birdied the first hole and Pilgrim bogeyed the second, the two players were even. And they stayed even until the 9th hole.

That's when Pilgrim exploded for three birdies in a row and five in seven holes. "I really got it going," said Pilgrim. "I could have really shot lights out."

At the 9th, Pilgrim hit a 9-iron within 20 feet of the hole and made the putt. He lofted a soft wedge shot within four feet

at the 10th and made that one, too. At the 11th, his 7-iron shot ended up three feet from the hole and he sank his third straight birdie putt.

Clayton parred all three holes and lost three strokes.

Pilgrim, who is a supervisor for a tree trimming company, has an inspirational golf background. His story points to the one of the great benefits of the game — it can be started at any time, and age is no barrier.

In his case, he didn't touch a club until he was 24 but still became a top notch player. He went to the course one day with the son of his boss, and "right off the bat, I played well. I was in the high 80s the first time I played. I said to myself: This is it. I'm gonna take it up."

Pilgrim, in what he calls "the time when I could really play," once had 12 straight rounds in the 60s. His lowest score was 63.

"I've been having back problems the last couple of year," he said. "Right now I play only on weekends, but I still go into every tournament trying to win it."

As Clayton attests, "This guy is a tiger, and he really deserved to win."

WHELAN, STACKHOUSE TAKE SENIOR FOUR-BALL

Ask Don Whelan of Deerfield Beach about his success in the State Senior Four-Ball Championship and he will detail a one-at-a-time strategy that became a golfing game.

"Dick (his partner, Dick Stackhouse of Boynton Beach) talked about it before we played," related Whelan, "and we decided we would have a crack at it if we shot about 5-under the second day."

The two players had opened with a best-ball 71 at Lone Palm Golf Club in Lakeland and trailed seven teams, including leaders Norton Harris and Paul Demick at 67.

"He birdied the 2nd hole," continued Whelan. "We counted to ourselves — that's one.

"Then I birdied the 5th hole — that's two.

"We just kept going that way. When we got birdies at 7 and 9, we had four down and one to go. We birdied 10, and then we decided to get one more for insurance."

And so Whelan and Stackhouse proceeded to blitz the field in the second round. By the time Whelan sank two birdie putts of 40-45 feet on the back side, the team had taken the lead and was coasting to victory. A finishing 65 save the two senior birdie makers a 136 total and a two-stroke triumph over Harris and Demick.

Actually, no one else broke 70 in the second round. Harris and Demick posted a 71, and the rest of the field floundered slightly in the wind that swept across beautiful Lone Palm.

"Not making a bogey all day was really fortunate," said Stackhouse. "The only time we came close was on the third

hole, where I made a six-footer for par. When Don sank those two gigantic putts on the back side, we were really having fun.

"We teamed awfully well. Both of us played well — 72 or better. I had just got out of the hospital three days earlier. I had prostate surgery. But I started playing about as well as I could."

Added Whelan: "The way we teamed was almost like from a textbook. One or both of us was in position for a birdie on every hole. We went back and forth and contributed about equally."

The two had played in the same tournament a year earlier, losing by one stroke when Whelan missed a 12-foot birdie putt on the final green.

This time, however, there was no stopping this dynamic duo.
