BILL EARLEY SHOOTS RECORD ROUND

The popular, 18th annual, "almost old-folks" tournament at Lehigh Country Club was the last event of '79 and produced some record numbers. Bill Earley, veteran Association competitor from Sarasota's Gator Creek, was the overall victor in the Life at Forty event, scoring a six under par 210 for the 54-hole distance.

Easy-rider Earley ripped it around in a smart seven under 65 the second day, in warm November sunshine, to outdistance the full field. His 71 the final day was exemplary as the last five holes were played in the rain.

The winning total, 74-65-71-210, was a record for the event and the second day 65 also a single-round record for the "40"." However, the 65 was a stroke shy of the best single-round effort in an FSGA event at Lehigh. Julian Arnold still claims the low score, a 64, which included a stroke penalty for inadvertently moving his ball on the putting green, during the 1977 State Amateur won by Jack Veghte.

Earley competed in the 40 to 54 year section which was won by Luther Essex of Maitland. Lynn Lee, Sebring, was the 55—64 winner and Dexter Daniels, Winter Haven, copped the 65 and over class. All division winners, in addition to merchandise certificates, were awarded special plaques bearing the champs' photograph in color.

Prior successes in FSGA events for the new champions came when Snyder was low amateur in the 1979 Gillespie Memorial Pro-Am at Longboat Key. Behl, partnered by Jack Nicklaus II, represented FSGA Juniors in 1978 in the Association's July 4 match in Scotland with St. Andrews University Town & Gown Team.

FSGA JUNIORS ARE NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Bill Byrne and Richard Etscorn, a pair of Orlando youngsters who clinched a place on the FSGA team with steady play at Augusta in mid-summer, proved sharper at home in November than in Georgia in June. The pair won the National Junior Team Golf Classic at Disney with an 11 under performance for 36 holes.

It was a four-stroke victory and earned an eight-column headline for Jim Carfield's fine story in the Orlando Sentinel in which the "Iron-nerved Orlando youngsters" were acclaimed for their win which saw them hit 17 greens the final day for

their 66-67-133 final numbers. Both will be back for junior competition next year. Byrne just turned 17 and Etscorn is 15 years old. He had won FSGA's 12-14 year state title last summer.

FAIRWAY FALLS, N.C. — If you've never wanted to own a mountain don't bother to read on.

This is a confession. Going public with a closely held desire harbored from kid days when I first visited the glory-ground of the Western North Carolina Mountains.

Journeying up the hill last month Mrs. C. and I reminisced through years of visitation, first with parents, then with our own young people, now as a twosome. Together we've logged almost 95 years in combined time coming-back-to-the-mountain.

Now, the good Lord willing, with the help of friends and a consortium of banks from the World Monetary Fund, we're going to have a hill of our own.

What'll we do with 450 acres of hillside besides love it?

We're going to build a fine, friendly retreat for mind, body and spirit in that corner of the Appalachian highlands where mountain mystique makes daily house calls and juices the spirit with lofty dreams and desires.

Sure there will be golf, tennis, ski slope and lodge, health spa, swimming, hiking, hotel, single family residential and condominium villa facilities.

But that's nuts and bolts stuff. The hardware. The big kick will be to see how many of our friends from 40 years in business, golf, politics, travel, aviation, military, prison camps, etc., will come visit our mountain. Will we pitch 'em to buy a piece? You can bet your sweet sprig of mountain laurel we will! And when the entire Fairway Falls Country Club plan in the Carey High-

lands, bursts full flower you'll be among the first to know all about it

We shall keep you posted on the development of the Elysian hills where old golfers will be recycled and cared for in body and spirit and dwell blissfully for years beyond par for their normal course.

Fairway Falls will sprout on Toxaway Mountain between Sapphire Valley and Lake Toxaway, both honored and respected vacation and summer home bastions for Floridians for eons. We have a mile of frontage on U.S. 64 about eight miles east of Cashiers. The property begins on the north side of the highway at the Jackson/Transylvania County line and proceeds easterly.

Up the hill (locals call it Hogback Mountain) the property rises from the county line at U.S. 64 to an elevation of 4,777 feet. The summit is adorned by Toxaway Tower, a fire watch station which enjoys a majestic 360 degree sweep of the highlands. The view is soul-boggling. If it doesn't cure what's wrong with you, check the column marked "beyond redemption."

It is from this point first development is planned for a ski slope at the highest elevation and northeast exposure. A lodge and the first interval ownership-time sharing condominium villas also will be built at the highest elevation.

A lofty designation which for so many years merely has been a line on a flight chart or road map to me — The Eastern Continental Divide — has taken on great new meaning for it now is the northeasterly property line of our mountain. This boundary in air space then takes a 90 degree turn to the southwest and returns to Highway 64 indicating the easterly confines.

Within those stirring 450 acres are waterfalls, streams, lake sites, mountain foliage and towering white pine reaching to touch the face of heaven. The golf course, planned for the lower 3,000 to 3,600 ft. level, will cover 160 acres. Housing will enjoy a density of four to seven units per acre, depending on type of structure.

If you didn't heed the warning in the first sentence and are still with us, or if you, too, have wished for a mountain in your future, stay tuned for future communication. You'll be hearing more . . . much more, about Fairway Falls.

1980 DUES NOW DUE AS COSTS INCREASE

We urge you to pay your dues promptly and fill in the essential information on the return envelope. Over the past seven years individual dues have increased 40% while the Association's general cost of doing business has gone up more than 75%. We could bring the deficit into balance with more computer handicap system members. Dues for individual non-computer members will be \$25. Computer members with a minimum of 25 or more club members on the system, will pay \$6 per person, per year, in advance. Any member joining the system during the year will pay \$6. All member clubs, with or without the FSGA computer service, will pay \$50 annual dues. We'll appreciate your prompt response which will enable the state office to fund the 1980 program for Florida State Golf Association members.
