State Amateur Tees Off At Haines

HAINES CITY - For the third traight year, the Florida State straight year, the Florida State. Amateur Golf Championship is without its defending champion.

A total of 159 tee off today in the state's most prestigious simon pure birdie quest, but 1973 winner Steve Morgan isn't here. He chose, instead, to bear down on his books at the University of Florida where he's working toward an August degree in journalism-public relations.

The Orlando two-time winner of the Olympic Regional Golf Classic won last year's crown at Ocala's Silver Springs Shores Country Club, outclassing one of the tournament's strongest fields with a fourunder-par 284.

DEFENDING TITLISTS also missed the field in 1972 and 1973. Gator captain Gary Koch, 1972 winner, elected to compete in the Sunnehanna Invitational in Pennsylvania last year, and 1971 victor Randy Sansing of Lakeland turned professional.

Koch is playing in the Sunnehanna 10 miles south of here, again this week, but three UF teammates give the state's oldest continuous sporting event another

strong Gator flavor.

Lakeland's Andy Bean, winner of the recent Falstaff Invitational at Pensacola, gets the pre-tournament favorite's role. The 20-year-old Florida junior is a member of the 1973 NCAA championship team and was runnerup in last year's State Amateur.

Other Gators expected to give their curly-haired teammate a run for his money are Ocala's Mike Sullivan and Quincy's Ben Duncan.

Two past champions—both from the Clearwater area-are worth keeping an eye on. They are insurance agents Jack Veghte and Bob Rankin. Veghte won at Panama City in 1968 and at Ormond Beach in 1970, while Rankin came out on top at Saratoga in 1969.

The tournament record of 278 set by John Darr at Palm Beach Gardens in 1967 probably is safe over the 7,000-yard, par 71 Grenelefe Golf and Racquet Club course just

THIS WAS the site of local U.S. Open qualifying May 20 when Zephyrhills pro David Lund was the medalist with 72-67-139, three under

Grenelefe is a rolling course, its fairways lined by towering pines and punctuated with plenty of water hazards. Its narrow fairways will demand driving accuracy and the undulating greens will require a safe-cracker's putting touch.

Until Morgan won last year, it had been a decade since an Orlando area player had annexed the state diadem. But there are a couple of contenders or more with the game to keep the Camp Trophy in Central Florida.

Maitland construction company president Jack Shubert appears to have the best chance after his string of four area victories in less than a year. The powerful, 39-year-old veteran won the Dora, Pine Meadows, Silver Lake and MAGA titles in



Orlando's Napier Tied For Lead

HAINES CITY - Ever dream of your game knitting together into a Nicklaus-Palmer composite of accuracy and finesse that vaults you to the top of the year's biggest tournament?

It can happen - even if you're 52, have a five handicap and have never

broken par on your home course.

Orlando's Billy Napier did it Thursday and tied two of Florida's finest amateurs - Andy Bean and Jack Veghte - for the opening day Florida Amateur Golf Championship lead.

"It's a super feeling," beamed the retired Air Force Colonel. "Anytime I can tool it around in 67 on this monster I tell you you've got to feel

That's right, a four-under-par 67 on the Nile-long and treacherous Grenelefe Golf and Racquet Club course that yielded one sub-par score during U.S. Open qualifying three weeks ago.

It was less than a week ago that the Tennessee-born Napier who moved to Orlando 15 months ago thought a pulled muscle in his right thigh would keep him out of Florida's most pretigious amateur clas-

"I was just sitting there in my easy chair, stretching out with a cigarette when something popped in my leg. I made the mistake of trying to play last Friday and I couldn't hit a tee

shot 150 yards," related Napier.
But the muscular disorder miraculously disappeared by Wednesday when the 184-pound Rio Pinar member played Grenelete for

the first time, shooting a 75. One of his Rio playing pals, Glen



Kirk who is another Orlandoan in good position with a 70, congratulated Napier and said, "Hey, Nape. This is a tough golf course.

"I DIDN'T know that," returned Napier, mimicking a popular automobile TV commercial.

Napier posted his excellent round before Veghte and Bean teed off in perfect playing conditions, negligible wind, temperatures in the 80s, tees forward and greens true as a billiard table.

"I've never seen this course play easier," said the 27-year-old Bean, the University of Florida ace who beat Walker Cup player Gary Koch in the recent Falstaff Invitational at Pensacola.

The big, curly-haired Bean, son of nationally-known Lakeland pro Tommy Bean, could have taken the lead all by himself except for two three-putt greens. "You can say I was very disappointed with my putting," understated the Gator sophomore who played the par 5s four-under, including an eagle 3 on the 564-yard monstrous eighth.

Napier and the 39-year-old Veghte, Florida Amateur winner in 1968 and 1970, were bogeyless. Billy played the back nine first and parred the first 10 holes before dropping a 10

His play on the par 5 holes was a continuation of his mastery of the longer holes. At Pensacola he played the par 5s 12 under par. And he was four-under on the par 5s Thursday.

There were four Orlando area players at par or better. Besides Napier and Kirk, there were Bill Loggins at 70 and Winter Park's Tony Kiraly at 71. Orlando college student Brian McNamara had 72, Lyman High golfer Gene Jones posted 73 and MAGA champion Jack Shubert fired 74. The low 32 scorers after today's round will make up the championship flight and all others will be assigned to lower flights. Play continues through Sunday.

State Amateur: Bean Vs. Pate, Gators Vs. Tide

HAINES CITY — Get out your pom poms and pennants.

Flòrida and Alabama are locked in a death grip for the state amateur golf championship.

Yep, it's the Gators against the Tide, Orange and Blue versus the Crimson and White. Only this time Florida isn't a 21-point longshot on the friendly grounds of Grenelefe

Golf and Racquet Club course.

Representing the Gators is 21year-old Andy Bean of Lakeland,
while the Tide banner is on the
shoulders of 20-year-old Jerry Pate.

Both players had five-under-par 137s after Friday's second round of the 57th Florida Amateur, Bean tagging a 70 onto Thursday's 67 and Pate reversing the scoring order.

Pate's second day 67 over the lengthened layout that yielded only nine scores of par or better was the talk of the tournament. And it conceivably could have been better.

The University of Alabama junior played the back nine first and "it

was the best I've ever hit the ball in my life." He made the turn at 34 with two birdies and missed five putts between six and 10 feet.

So much tougher was the 7,000yard test from Thursday that Orlando's Bill Loggins vaulted from 70 to 80, Stuart's Larry Rinker went from 68 to 78, Winter Haven's Dexter Daniels Jr. soared from 71 to 81 and Orlando's Billy Napier leaped from 67 to 77.

BUT THE blond haired Pate didn't notice the difference. And who would the way he split the fairways with his drives and rifled his approach shots to the pins?

Only twice did the Alabama-born Pensacolan miss a fairway or a green and his only bogey was the result of a three putt.

By contrast, the bull-strong Bean had an erratic day of five birdies and four bogies. "I'm not at all pleased with the way I played," said affable Andy.

Napier and two-time Amateur winner Jack Veghte of Clearwater. Napier said he played about as well as he did Thursday, even though he was 10 strokes higher. But Veghte could have taken the lead except for a four-hole stretch in which he was four-over-par.

The insurance agent's 73 left him all alone in third place, three shots behind Bean and Pate. In fourth place was 18-year-old Dallas Apelgren, a former Pee Wee contestant and Jack Nicklaus protege who recorded 71-70—141.

So, with two rounds remaining, the state's premier amateur classic could develop into an exciting showdown between two friendly rivals who are eager for victory over the other.

It's uncanny how much the two collegiates have in common. Both are transplanted Floridians from another southern state. Both are college seniors next year. Both are marketing majors. And both are staying with Andy's parents this weekend.

"But I'm taking him to a motel after today," joked Bean after his pal of some five years tied him for the lead.



Almost as long off the tee as Bean, despite a 40-pound weight disparity, Pate began shakily, seeing his lead vanish in seven holes as a result of three bogies and two Bean birdies.

When Jerry's third shot hit the pin and stopped a foot short of the hole on the par 5 eighth, it looked as if he would be in the lead again. But Bean performed a miracle shot of his own.

Andy's second shot to the 564-yard test plopped in a trap at the edge of the green and his explosion from a downhill lie barely made it out of the sand. He was short of the putting carpet with a difficult lie.

That's when he went to work with a pitching wedge, holing out for a birdle from 40 feet to hold on to his tie. At the 442-yard ninth hole, however, Andy drove into the woods to the right where he was stymied behind a tree.

ONLY A one-putt kept him from taking a double bogey and Pate was on top again. Then came the 438-yard 10th and Bean moved into the lead for the first time since the 17th hole of Friday's round, sinking a 20-foot birdie while Pate missed a four-footer for a bogey.

Almost immediately Bean threw it away at the 565-yard 11th, bogeying from 30 yards when his wedge approach flew the green and he failed to get up and down. "The wind held up Jerry's sand wedge shot (when he hit a trip in front), so I figured the wind wouldn't hold up a pitching wedge ... and it didn't," explained Andy.

Pate blasted four feet from the pin and sank his par putt, while Bean took three from over the green. The match was knotted until No. 14.

ANOTHER crucial Pate shot came on the 310-yard 12th where Andy drove to the front edge of the green and Pate was far to the right beneath a clump of pine trees. He wedged 12. feet from the hole and made the putt for a birdie while Andy missed his eagle attempt. barely

"That was the biggest hole," said Pate. "It was the first really good putt I hit. That was the turning point as far as I was concerned." When he birdied No. 15 for a two-shot edge, "I knew I had it if I played it smart." Bean, member of last year's Gator NCAA championship team which will defend its title in San Diego in two weeks, had a chance to close the gap when his approach to the 17th hole settled only four feet from the cup.
"I thought I'd make it, but it didn't

go in," bemoaned Bean. "That was

what killed me."

HAINES CITY — It was through Andy Bean's insistance that the University of Florida Golfer lost his bid for the 57th annual State Amateur crown at Grenelefe's rolling links yesterday.

Jerry Pate's third round five stroke lead proved good enough to give the University of Alabama golfer a one stroke victory with a three-over-par 74 in the final round for his 279 total.

He was one stroke off the all-time four day total standard set by John Darr Jr. in the 1967 PGA National.

Bean, whose persistance brought Pate to the Florida Amateur, finished second at 280 after firing a sub-par-69.

Bean put his putting game together through the first eight holes and picked up five strokes to tie the Pensacolan with birdies on holes five, seven and eight. Bean bogied nine and the collegiate dual turned into a dogfight after the turn.

Bean birdied 10; Pate bogied. Bean bogied 11 and Page came up a par. At 12, both Bean and Pate drew birdies but said Pate, "That was a biggie. It was the first putt I had made all day that really amounted to something. I knew I was back in stride when I sank that 12-footer."

Pate foiled Bean's chance to go ahead on 14. Bean had gotten to the green in two, but two-putted for a par. Pate, who had a bad fairway shot, chipped in over the trap to par the hole. "When he holed on the wedge on 14, that's what made it," Bean said after the title bout.
